# **LETTING GO & TRUSTING GOD**

A few weeks ago we surprised our Bahamas Mission Team with a trip to iFly Trapeze for some character-forming, faith-stretching, team-building fun. In our conversations still scary the moment we had to afterward, we discussed how the trapeze was a great metaphor of life in Christ. Here are a few of the parallels we observed.

Mystery. Just like we did not know what we were doing until we arrived that Saturday morning, many times God doesn't tell us what's around the next corner in our journey with Him. If He did we most likely would not go and would miss out on so many of the adventures He leads us into.

Fear. When many of our team members first saw what we were going to be doing, their first reaction was, "No way. I'm not doing it." How many times do we round the bend on our journey with God and see the challenge in front of us and respond in fear?

Faith. Then the employees from iFly came around and put harnesses on everyone, and assured us that we could do it. They were seeking to infuse us with faith. When we are confronted with mystery and fear on our journey with Christ, we must remind ourselves that "nothing is impossible with God" (Luke 1:37) (Matthew 17:20), and that we "can do all things through Christ who gives us strength" (Philippians 4:13).

Listening & Obeying. Next we were given instructions and told that if we would follow the instructions carefully, doing what we were told, everything would be fine. In Luke 11:28, Jesus said, "Blessed are those who hear the word of God and obey it." (Proverbs 4:20-22) We were also warned that if we didn't listen and obey, it could result in problems, even injuries. In Deuteronomy 28 God spells out the blessings for obeying the terms of His covenant in 14 verses. He then spends 54 verses spelling out the curses that could happen if they disobey. Our loving

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Heavenly Father not only tells us the blessings we will experience when we choose to obey Him, He also loves us enough to warn us of the consequences of not obeying.

Challenge & Discomfort. Even after we understood what was before us, it was climb the ladder and jump off the edge. God is less interested in our comfort and happiness than in our growth and maturity, so He often leads us to do things we don't want to do in order to stretch us.

Encouragement. When each one of us got to the ledge, there was a moment of fear and we were tempted to turn back. In that moment, what a blessing to hear the voices of our teammates shouting words of encouragement to us. In our journey with Christ, we need people who will encourage us and hold us accountable when we want to quit. We need people who will cheer for us to continue moving forward in God. (Hebrews 10:25)

Trust. In that moment of panic, we also heard the voices of the employees telling us to simply listen and obey and trust their experience and the equipment. God has given us His Holy Spirit to whisper into our hearts that we can trust the wisdom of God, and that He is present with us in this journey. (John 14 & 16)

Assurance. Finally, we were connected to safety lines, and even if the worst case scenario were to play out and we missed the bar or did not get our timing right for the catch, we knew that below us was a big safety net to catch us. God is sovereign, and even when we make mistakes, His grace and love are there to catch us when we fall. We know that we can learn from our mistakes and we can get up and go again. "And we know that God works all things together for the good of those who love God and are called according to His purposes" (Romans 8:28).



I recently spoke in church about wisdom. One of the things I suggested is that the size of your vision determines the strength of your wisdom and the significance of your impact. Let me break that statement down for you.

If your vision is only as big as today, you will make decisions solely based on what feels good and makes you happy in the moment with little regard for the consequences of your actions. If your vision is as big as this lifetime, you will live according to the wisdom and values of this world. You will make decisions based on your goals for the next 75 years or so. For example, this world defines success in terms of money, so you might be willing to sacrifice some things you want to do today because you are thinking about something bigger down the road. Rather than spending \$100 that you receive, you put it in savings because you want to buy a car or have money to retire one day. This is good, but I would suggest to you that your vision is still too small. I want you to expand your vision beyond this lifetime. I want you to see that you have been created by God to live forever, and that the decisions you make today have can have an impact for all eternity. But you have to invest in that which will *last* into eternity.

When you die, you will not be able to take your money or your possessions with you. Jesus said, "Don't store up treasures here on earth, where moths eat them and rust destroys them, and where thieves break in and steal. Store your treasures in heaven, where moths and rust cannot destroy, and thieves do not break in and steal. Wherever your treasure is, there the desires of your heart will also be" (Matthew 6:19-21). # DEVOTIONAL

As I write this, it's Memorial
Day weekend, a great time
to challenge ourselves to
take inspiration from our
U.S. service people and our
conversations in Youth
Group to think about courage

in the choices we make as Christians, especially the choice to put Christ first in our lives. Our beloved American service people trust our country's elected leaders to act wisely in deploying them as they wittingly put themselves in harm's way to fulfill the mission of protecting the Unites States' interests and us citizens. Ultimately, our service people cannot avoid the reality that they may be required to make sacrifices that are profound, including the loss of their earthly lives. The faith and courage they demonstrate in just making the choice to serve in the first place are remarkable.

We've been learning in our groups on Sunday mornings that true faith in Jesus is also an "all

in" proposition. It can feel like an impossible leap of courage to abandon my belief that "I know best" and to commit all my choices and current ambitions to Christ. In John 11: 1-16
Jesus spoke to his disciples about a decision he was making to undertake a hazardous trip to see Lazarus despite the disciples' very practical concern for his safety. To help them understand His actions, He used the metaphor of a person trying to navigate in the darkness of night versus the light of day to demonstrate the folly of using one's own, human understanding to make important decisions instead of committing to seek and follow God's will.

Major Tim Vakoc, a Christian, US Army Chaplain who served in the Iraq conflict suffered a traumatic brain injury resulting from an enemy IUD on May 29, 2004, the 12<sup>th</sup> anniversary of his ordination. In a letter to his sister, sent several months before his injury, he summed up his full faith and trust in Christ beautifully: "The safest place for me to be is in the center of God's will, and if that is in the line of fire, that is where I will be." Tim passed away on June 20, 2009, and while he was awarded a Bronze Star and Purple Heart, his decision to live a



committed, faithful life of Christian service resulted in a far more important legacy, the inspiration of many to examine their own faith

and commitment.

Tim Vakoc's example is extreme but how can we relate Tim's experience to our own and be inspired by his example?
